
The Story of the first Thanksgiving

Gather books both fiction and non-fiction about Indians, Pilgrims, and The First Thanksgiving. Get your students familiar with both the Pilgrims and the Indians and how they lived. Using fiction stories is still very effective in getting them thinking and talking about life during this time. I have always found enough at my school library and my public library to fill my November read aloud basket.

Directions:

Once the students have the basic knowledge of the First Thanksgiving, I read my large Story of the First Thanksgiving (The following Sheets) I pair students up with a buddy to illustrate one of the pages of the story. (once in awhile you may need three students together) Be sure to mix strong readers with weak readers. We talk about the colors you would be see at the time of the Natives. We talk about how to share a drawing with someone. I explain that many people will see this special drawing. The partners are sent off to illustrate their part of the story. When everyone is finished I have them practice reading their sentence together. Then we sit in order around the rug and retell the story in a reader's theatre style. I gather these pictures and mount them on black construction paper. Then I laminate them and we perform our reader's theatre to other classes, school staff, and our parents.


On another day, have students take their I am thankful prewriting paper and create sentences on the


"I am Thankful" writing paper. I use the turkey art to go with the I am thankful writing for a bulletin board.












Turkey Art Project

For this project, you will need a color picture of each student's head.


Cut each student's head before the project. It is best if it is on cardstock or photo paper rather than regular paper.

You can use colored feathers from the craft section of a store if you want to really enhance the effect of this cute turkey.

Students make a large brown construction paper circle. They use their hands as the turkey body. They trace and cut out their hand on red, yellow, green, and orange construction paper. Next, they make a red gobbler and a diamond shaped yellow diamond that folds into a beak on the child's nose and mouth. Here's the finished product:




Here's how I put it together with their writing. I use it for a bulletin board and then at the end of the year it becomes a page in their art and writing book.



Program Costumes


Pilgrim Girl The Pilgrim girl gets a paper bonnet with a rounded collar. I also hot glue a little bow to the front of the collar. The most elaborate costume I ever did had a little apron. The apron is not necessary.





Pilgrim Boys

Pilgrim boys get a hat headband with a square collar. I also make a black paper belt with a yellow buckle.





The Turkey

All the turkeys get a turkey headband. This year we added real feathers instead of construction paper feathers for fun. A parent also made little paper hand sleeves covered in feathers. Normally just the headband is what my turkeys wear. The turkeys can be both girls and boys.
